EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATIONS:

(1) Adopt the Resolution No. 2024-06 approving the Sphere of Influence Amendment for County Service Area (CSA) 66;

- (2) Adopt Resolution No. 2024-07 approving the annexation of approximately 93.13 acres into County Service Area (CSA) 66, for a 308 single family residential subdivision, known as LAFC 2023-0003 (Rio Del Oro), subject to its terms and conditions;
- (3) Adopt the Resolution No. 2024-08 approving the Sphere of Influence Amendment for the Olivehurst Public Utility District (OPUD)
- (4) Adopt Resolution No. 2024-09 approving the annexation of approximately 25.416 acres into Olivehurst Public Utility District known as LAFC 2023-0007(Rio Del Oro), subject to its terms and conditions, together with Resolution 2024-0008 shall be referred to as a Reorganization.

I. BACKGROUND:

A. Summary:

(1) There is a request from Lennar Homes to amend the sphere of influence for County Service Area (CSA) 66 and annex approximately 93.13 acres into County Service Area (CSA) 66. The project area is located along Algodon Road and the intersection of Plumas Lake Blvd in Yuba County and is also known as APN Nos. 016-040-111, -114, -118 thru 016-040-133.

This annexation to County Service Area (CSA) No. 66 is to provide extended services including road and drainage maintenance; parks, street lighting, and fire protection facilities as per Condition No. 61 of TSTM 2004-29

(2) In addition, there is a request from Lennar Homes to amend the OPUD sphere of influence and to annex the westerly strip of the Rio Del Oro project consisting of

approximately 25.416 acres into Olivehurst Public Utility District (OPUD). The project area is located near Algodon Road and the intersection of Plumas Lake Blvd, is in Yuba County and is also known as **APN Nos. 016-040-111, 016-040-126 thru 130.**

The 25.416 acre annexation into OPUD is intended to be left as an Ag Buffer as outlined in the final map conditions. The services provided by OPUD for this area will be mostly for maintenance and will require water, lanscaping and street lighting.

The annexations to CSA 66 and OPUD together shall be processed as a reorganization.

The total assessed value is \$10.815.002

Note: CSA 70 is a county-wide CSA and therefore, no annexation will be required. However a benefit zone will need to be established by the County.

Fire Services will remain with the Linda Fire Protection District which will collect CSA 66 fees for its benefit.

Staff recommends that the Yuba Local Agency Commission approve the Sphere of Influence Amendments and the reorganization for CSA 66 and OPUD, subject to the terms and conditions stated in the proposed resolutions.

B. Proposals and Justification:

On February 16, 2005 the Yuba County Planning Commission approved TSTM 2004-0029 (Kamilos) requiring various public services to be provided within the subject territory (TSTM 2004-0029, Condition No.61). The project was found to be consistent with the previously adopted Plumas Lake Specific Plan EIR and Mitigation Monitoring Plan, as required by the California Environmental Quality Act, therefore it was found to be exempt from any further environmental reivew.

This reorganization consists of a CSA 66 Sphere of Influence Amendment and the annextion of 93.13 acres into CSA #66; and a OPUD Sphere of Influence amendment and the annexation of the westerly strip, approximately 25.416 acres into OPUD. Lands to be annexed to CSA 66 are to remain within the Linda Fire Protection District and OPUD in accordance with the adopted Spheres of Influence. Fire fees are to be collected by CSA 66 on behalf of the Linda Fire Protection District. The territory is not currently within the Yuba LAFCO's approved Sphere of Influence for CSA No.66., and a portion of the territory is not currently within the Yuba LAFCO's approved Sphere of Influence for OPUD.

There is no other existing organization that can readily provide services for this area. CSA No.66 will provide extended services including street, landscape, and lighting maintenance; drainage maintenance; parks maintenance and recreation services; structural fire protection; and emergency services.

The development of this project will provide additional housing in the Plumas Lake Specific Plan

(PLSP) area. The site is located in the Plumas Lakes Specific Plan adopted in 1992 by Yuba County. An Environmental Impact Report has been prepared and certified for the PLSP.

mitigations have been incorporated into the project design for the entire subdivision therefore, no further environmental review is necessary.

C. Location:

The reorganization area is located on Assessor's Parcels **016-040-111**, **-114**, **-118 thru 016-040-133**. This annexation is located along Algodon Road and the intersection of Plumas Lake Blvd and is west of State Route 70, within Yuba County.

D. Purpose:

The purpose of annexing into CSA No.66 is for extended road and landscaping maintenance, street lighting, drainage maintenance, and structural fire protection as well as other services in which CSA No.66 is authorized to provide to new residential subdivisions. The purpose of the annexation into OPUD is to provide water, street lighting, landcaping maintenance, and other services as needed for the westerly Ag buffer area of the west side of the Rio Del Oro Subdivision. Linda Fire Protection District will remain within the Linda Fire Protection District.

III SPHERE OF INFLUENCE AMENDMENT POLICY

A component of this annexation is a Sphere of Influence amendment is required to include the 93.13-acre territory into the Sphere of Influence for the CSA 66.

A component of this annexation is a Sphere of Influence amendment is required to include the 25.41-acre territory into the Sphere of Influence for OPUD.

In determining the sphere of influence for each local agency, the Commission shall prepare a written statement of determinations with respect to each of the following:

- a. The present and the planned land uses in the area, including agricultural and open-space lands.
- b. The present and probable need for public facilities and services in the area.
- c. The present capacity of public facilities and adequacy of public services, which the agency provides or is authorized to provide.
- d. The existence of any social or economic communities of interest in the area if the commission determines that they are relevant to the agency.
- e. A fifth determination relating to Disadvantaged Unincorporated Communities is required for those Sphere amendments involving Domestic Water, Wastewater and Fire

protection. This request for CSA 66 is for a district that does not provide these services and therefore does not apply in this application.

How do we address OPUD for the DUCs?

Before making these determinations, the Commission will review the following:

i.) The service capacity, levels and types of services currently provided by the agency and the areas where these services are provided, topographic factors, financial capabilities, costs of service, and social and economic interdependencies;

Note: CSA 66 appears to provide adequate services to several subdivisions in the Plumas Lake area and will provide adequate services to serve this 308 lot subdivision.

OPUD is already committed to provide adequate water and wastewater services to the residential area of the 308 lot subdivision. OPUD will provide adequate services to the additional 24.41 acres ag buffer to be annexed.

ii.) Existing and planned land uses, land use plans and policies; consistency with county and city general plans; projected growth in the affected area, and potential effects on agricultural and open space lands.

Note: The CSA #66 and the OPUD reorganization territory are consistent with land uses being within the Medium Density Residential and Valley Neighborhood.

iii.) A description of the services that will be provided to any areas which may be added to the sphere and the timing and method for funding expansion of facilities or services to those areas.

Note: The CSA 66 provides street, landscape, and lighting maintenance; drainage maintenance; parks maintenance and recreation services; structural fire protection; and emergency services.

OPUD provides water, wastewater, landscape, lighting and recreation services.

iv.) An analysis of the effects of a proposed sphere of influence amendment on other agencies and their service capabilities.

Note: As territory develops additional maintenance costs will be received by the County Public Works Dept. to adequately provide services throughout the CSA 66.

OPUD is the only agency capable of providing services is the SOI Amendment area, therefore there is no impacts to other agencies.

f. A substantial SOI amendment is an amendment that causes the SOI to be internally inconsistent, is inconsistent with provisions of the CKH Act, has the potential to cause significant adverse social, economic, environmental, or other consequences, or has substantial adverse regional planning implication. Substantial SOI amendments shall not be processed until service reviews are completed (§56430) and the subject SOI is updated consistently with §56425.

Note: N/A

g. A substantial SOI amendment may be processed concurrently with a service review and incorporated into a SOI update. However, LAFCO will make service review determinations prior to considering a substantial SOI amendment (§56425, §56430).

h. A review of a municipal services pertaining to a subject SOI will be prepared prior to, or in conjunction with, each SOI update (§56430) or substantial amendment unless the Commission determines that a prior service review remains adequate.

Note: the review of Municipal Services was previously completed.

i. When determining which local agency should provide services, considerable weight will be given to an agency's ability and willingness to provide services. When more than one agency can serve an area, LAFCO shall also consider the conclusion of service reviews, each agency's service capacity, financial capabilities, and costs to provide service. Social and economic interdependencies, topographic, historic and environmental factors, input from affected communities and agencies, and pertinent LAFCO policies shall also be considered (§56668, §56430).

Note: This has been completed as part of the MSR/Sphere Options process and these CSA 66 and OPUD are the best agencies to provide services to the annexation area.

j. LAFCO shall prioritize pending or anticipated SOI actions and related services review and consider preliminary work plans as part of its annual work plan and budget hearing processes, although the Commission may consider SOI proposals whether or not they are reflected in the budget. The Commission may also initiate related service reviews. The Commission may also need to review or approve final SOI work plans and other processing recommendations.

Note: This policy is not applicable to this proposal

k. Agencies will be asked to participate in an SOI scoping session and complete SOI/service review questionnaires relating to their services and plans. Agencies will be required to complete and submit questionnaires within 90 days. Failure to respond within 90 days will be regarded as concurrence with Executive Officer recommendations.

Note: This was completed as part of the MSR/SOI process

OTHER RELATED POLICIES:

a. LAFCO will make every attempt to establish Spheres of Influence acceptable to affected agencies, property owners, and other stakeholders but ultimately, LAFCO is the final determinant of a Sphere of Influence.

i.) Inclusion within an agency's sphere of influence does not ensure annexation to that agency.

Note: Establishment of a Sphere Update for the CSA 66 and OPUD will not ensure any additional annexations. However, this is not the proposal at this time.

ii.) In order to encourage orderly growth of urban areas, the Commission promotes infill development of incorporated vacant lands located adjacent to already developed areas.

Note: This is the case with this annexation to CSA #66 or OPUD

iii.) Developed lands, which benefit from municipal services and are contiguous to a city boundary should be annexed to the city that provides service.

iv.) Spheres of influence for cities and districts should respect the long-term preservation and protection of the County's agricultural and open space resources when not in conflict with Policy 4.5.3.

v.) When an application for a new sphere of influence involves a City, the City and County are required to meet prior to submitting the application to LAFCO, to attempt to reach a mutual agreement regarding the boundaries, development standards, and zoning requirements for the proposed sphere. These agreements are required to carry great weight in any LAFCO decision (§56425).

SOI Determinations:

Pursuant to Government Code Section 56425, LAFCO must consider four specific issues prior to making written determinations to support its action in amending the Sphere of Influence for CSA 66 and OPUD These are discussed in the following paragraphs:

1. The present and planned land uses in the area, including agricultural and open space lands.

Present and planned land uses in the area are part of the Plumas Lake Specific Plan and include medium density residential land type uses. The existing land uses surrounding the subject lands consist of mostly are part of the Plumas Lake Specific Plan with medium density residential parcels with the exception of agricultural zoning to the west of the Rio Del Oro development.

A condition of TSTM 2004-0029 was for the Lennar Homes to establish an Ag Buffer along the westerly strip of the development. OPUD will provide required services to the westerly 24.416 acre Ag Buffer upon the SOI amendment and annexation.

2. The present and probable need for public facilities and services in the area.

The current property within the territory requires street, landscape, and lighting maintenance; drainage maintenance; parks maintenance and recreation services; structural fire protection; and emergency services. CSA 66 provides those services.

OPUD provides water, wastewater, landscaping, street lighting, and recreational services. The westerly ag buffer annexation area for the Rio Del Oro development will require some of those services from OPUD.

3. The present capacity of public facilities and adequacy of services that the agency is authorized to provide.

CSA 66 provides street, landscape, and lighting maintenance; drainage maintenance; parks maintenance and recreation services; structural fire protection; and emergency services service to existing and proposed development in the Plumas Lake area. This territory is not included in the Sphere of Influence. The Yuba County Public Works Department does not anticipate any restrictions in being able to provide these services to the parcel.

OPUD provides water, wastewater, landscaping, street lighting, and park services to existing and proposed development in the Plumas Lake area including the Rio Del Oro development, however the 25.416 westerly Ag Buffer territory is not included in the Sphere of Influence. OPUD does not anticipate any restrictions in being able to provide these services to the parcel.

4. The existence of any social or economic land communities of interest in the area if the Commission determines that they are relevant to the community.

The subject territory is located contiguous to CSA #66 and is proposed to be included within its boundaries and its Sphere of Influence. CSA #66 is the only street, landscape, and lighting maintenance; drainage maintenance; parks maintenance and recreation services; structural fire protection; and emergency services service provider near the area.

5. A determination regarding Disadvantaged Unincorporated Communities is required for Sphere amendments involving Domestic Water, Wastewater and Fire protection.

This determination is not applicable to this proposal for CSA 66 since there are no adjacent disadvantaged unincorporated communities.

Conclusion:

The above policy considerations and determinations are the basis to support the inclusion of 93.13 acres to the Sphere of Influence for CSA #66. And the 25.416 acres to the Sphere of Influence for Olivehurst Public Utility District (OPUD). Recommended actions are presented in accordance with the requirements of the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000 as they apply to the Sphere of Influence Studies.

K. Governing Law and LAFCO Policy

LAFCO is charged with applying the policies and provisions of the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Act to its decisions regarding annexations, incorporations, reorganizations, and other changes of government. LAFCO's review of projects must be consistent with the policy directives of the LAFCO Act. Specifically, LAFCO's policies are designed to:

- a) <u>Provide Information</u>. Give applicants for changes of organization guidance as to the information LAFCO needs to make appropriate determinations concerning their applications and provide information and notice to elected officials, governmental staff, and members of the general public as to the standards and procedures that LAFCO will use in evaluating applications.
- b) <u>Set Criteria.</u> Provide applicants for changes of organization with explicit guidance as to the criteria LAFCO will use in approving, disapproving, amending, or conditionally approving applications for changes of organization.
 - c) Ensure Greater Consistency in LAFCO's decision-making process.
 - d) <u>Facilitate Communication</u> among local agencies in the region.
 - e) Minimize Adverse Impacts of the social, economic and environmental results of growth.
- f) <u>Provide for Planned, Well-Ordered Efficient Urban Development Patterns</u> with appropriate consideration of preserving open space lands within those patterns.

WHEREAS, the Commission has set the hearing date of <u>July 24, 2024</u>, for an amendment for sphere of influence for County Service Area (CSA) 66 and has noticed this hearing at the times and as otherwise prescribed by Government Code Section 56150, *et seq.*; and

WHEREAS, the Commission has heard and adopted a Municipal Services Review of services provided by County Service Area (CSA) 66 in accordance with Gov. Code section 56430; and

WHEREAS, the Commission has reviewed and considered the proposed Sphere of Influence amendment report and the proposed Sphere of Influence Amendment Map which are attached hereto and incorporated herein; and

WHEREAS, Yuba County prepared the Plumas Lakes Specific Plan and EIR for development within the Plumas Lake area and this Sphere of Influence amendment is Consistent; and

WHEREAS, the Commission has considered those factors determined by it to be relevant to the proposed sphere of influence amendment, including, but not limited to, those factors specified in Government Code Section 56425, et seq., and has heard from interested parties and considered requests for amendment and/or revision of the proposed updated sphere boundary, if any;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Yuba Local Agency Formation Commission does hereby find and determine as follows:

- That the proposed sphere of influence amendment with respect to County Service Area #66
 complies with the provisions of Government Code Section 56000, et seq. and shall apply to
 street, streetlight, drainage, and landscape services and CSA assessments to fund extended
 fire, EMS, and park maintenance services.
- 2. That no significant protests have been received regarding the establishment of this Sphere of Influence amendment.

- 3. That, pursuant to Government Code Section 56425, the Commission makes and adopts those determinations set forth in the Executive Officer's report dated July 24, 2024. attached hereto and incorporated herein.
- 4. Pursuant to Government Code Section 56425 (i) County Service Area (CSA) 66 is authorized to provide street, streetlight, drainage, and landscape services and CSA assessments to fund extended fire, EMS, and park maintenance services within the territory set forth in Attachment "A". Other services a County Service Area may provide as stated in the Government Code shall be considered latent powers and be subject to subsequent LAFCo approval.
- 5. 

WHEREAS, Lennar Homes has filed an application for the annexation of 93.13 acres more or less into County Service Area No. 66 as described and depicted in Exhibits "A" and "B", attached hereto and incorporated herein as referenced, was filed with the Executive Officer of the Yuba Local Agency Formation Commission pursuant to the requirements of the Cortese-Know-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act (Section 56000 et seq of the Government Code); and

WHEREAS, said formation of County Service Area No. 66 was approved to provide extended services including structural fire protection; local park, recreation or parkway facilities and services; and miscellaneous extended services including street and highway sweeping; street and highway lighting; landscape maintenance; park and open space maintenance; drainage system maintenance; fire services; and emergency services; and

WHEREAS, the Executive Officer has provided a notice of Public Hearing as described in the Government Code; and

WHEREAS, the Executive Officer reviewed the application and determined its completeness within 30 days of their submission and prepared and filed his report with this Commission at least five days prior to the regularly scheduled meeting during which this application is to be considered; and

WHEREAS, this Commission has considered the application, the report of the Executive Officer, the environmental document or determination, applicable General and Specific Plans, and each of the factors required by Government Code Section 56668 to be considered in the review of a proposal; and

WHEREAS, The County of Yuba prepared and certified an EIR for the Plumas Lakes Specific Plan on August 4, 1993, pursuant to the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (Section 21000 et seq of the Public Resources Code) This EIR adequately addressed the environmental effects of this proposal and no further environmental review is needed or required.

WHEREAS, information satisfactory to this Commission has been presented that all the owners of land within the affected territory have given their written consent for the proposal; and

WHEREAS, all interested parties and proponents of the proposal were heard at a public meeting held on July 24, 2024

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, DETERMINED AND ORDERED by the Yuba Local Agency Formation Commission as follows:

- 1. The foregoing recitals are true and correct.
- 2. Approval of this annexation is conditioned upon the applicant's obligation to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the Yuba Local Agency Formation Commission and its agents, officers and employees from any claim, action or proceeding against the Commission or its agents, officers, and employees; including all costs, attorney's fees, expenses and liabilities incurred in the defense of such claim, action, or proceeding to attack, set aside, or void the approval or determinations of this Commission concerning this reorganization The Yuba Local Agency Formation Commission shall promptly notify the applicant of any such claim, action, or proceeding and be entitled to representation by counsel of its choosing.
- 3. As provided by Government Code Section 56886, the owners of land (current and future) within the affected territory shall agree to support the levying or fixing and the collection of any assessment and (or) special tax and (or) Mello-Roos Community Facilities District for the services for which CSA No. 66 is authorized and (or) required by Yuba County TSTM 2004-0029 for this annexation. The applicants shall also be required to pay its pro-rata share of costs associated with any services being financed, maintained, improved or otherwise provided by County Service Area 66. The pro-rata share shall be determined by the Yuba County Director of Public Works. It is contemplated that the pro-rata share will consist of a per-parcel or per-acre assessment, fee and (or) Special Tax. On January 24, 2023, the Yuba County Board of Supervisors Passed Resolution 2023-0007 (attached as Exhibit D) supporting the annexation of Rio Del Oro Villages 17-20 into County Service Area No. 66 and set forth the specific area where the CSA funding and the amounts are to be placed. Prior to the sale of any portion within the 93.13 acre territory the applicants shall guarantee any and all fees and taxes be placed on each parcel of land being sold within the subdivision. Verification of the assessment to the parcels shall be forwarded to LAFCo.
- 4. Any previously authorized fees, taxes and (or) assessments shall be extended to the annexation territory as provided for in Government Code Section 56886.
- 5. As provided by Government Code Section 56886, the owners of land within the

affected territory shall agree to be placed within a benefit zone for CSA 70 and agree to pay an annual assessment for law enforcement services as a method of minimizing the effects of this annexation upon the local governmental structure of Yuba County.

- 6. In reviewing this application, the Commission finds that all property owners in said territory consent to this annexation into County Service Area 66.
- 7. In reviewing this application, the Commission finds that all of the extended services provided by CSA 66 proposed are necessary and that there will not be a duplication of powers with any other special district.
- 8. In reviewing this application, this Commission has considered each of the factors required by Government Code Section 56668 and LAFCO's policies.
- 9. The LAFCO Executive Officer's Staff Report and Recommendation for approval of the proposal is hereby adopted.
- 10. The geographic description and map, if rejected by the State Board of Equalization, will be revised at the expense of the applicant.
- 11. The boundaries, as set forth in the proposal or as amended by action of the Commission, are hereby approved as submitted and are as described in Exhibit "A" Geographic Description and "B" Map attached hereto and by this reference incorporated herein subject to the terms and conditions included.
- 12. Said territory is found to be uninhabited.
- 13. The subject proposal is assigned the following short form designation: Rio Del Oro Villages **Annexation to CSA No.66 (LAFC-2023-0003)**
- 14. The boundaries of the affected territory are found to be definite and certain.
- 15. The County of Yuba prepared and certified an EIR with mitigation measures for the Plumas Lakes Specific Plan on August 4, 1993, pursuant to the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (Section 21000 et seq of the Public Resources Code) On February 16, 2005 the County of Yuba makes a specific determination for TSTM 2004-2029 that the issues and mitigation measures as adopted by the lead agency adequately addresses this annexation and no further environmental review is needed or required.
- 16. As stated in the LAFCO Staff Report of July 24, 2024, and Board of Supervisor's Resolution 1980-2 attached herein as Exhibit "C", the amount of base property tax and incremental property tax transferred to CSA No. 66 from the County General Fund pursuant to Section 99 of the California Revenue and Taxation Code shall be

 - a. Annexation to a zone of benefit within CSA 66 to include funding for structural fire protection and EMS services on behalf of the Linda Fire Protection District as authorized in Government Code Section 25213.
 - b. Miscellaneous extended services including street and highway sweeping; street and highway lighting; landscape maintenance; park and open space maintenance; parkway maintenance drainage system maintenance; fire services; and emergency services as authorized in Government Code Section 25213.
- 19. The project proponent(s) shall agree to be placed within a benefit zone of proposed CSA 70 and agree to pay an annual assessment for law enforcement services as a method of minimizing the effects of this annexation upon the local governmental structure of Yuba County. 

- 2. That no significant protests have been received regarding the establishment of this Sphere of Influence amendment.

- 3. That, pursuant to Government Code Section 56425, the Commission makes and adopts those determinations set forth in the Executive Officer's report dated July 24, 2024. attached hereto and incorporated herein.
- 4. Pursuant to the Public Resources Code the Olivehurst Public Utility District to provide Domestic Water, Wastewater, Parks and Recreation and Fire Protection services. - 5. The Commission has reviewed and affirms the EIR for the Plumas Lakes Specific Plan prepared for the Plumas Lakes Area and affirms the environmental findings contained therein prepared for this Sphere of Influence update and makes a specific finding that there is no substantial evidence in light of the whole record before Yuba Local Agency Formation Commission that this Sphere Amendment for the Olivehurst Public Utility District will not have a significant adverse effect on the environment since no additional service area for the aforementioned services will be added.
- 6. The Commission hereby determines the following:
 - 1. The present and planned land uses in the area, including agricultural and open space lands.

Present and planned land uses in the area include low to medium density residential land type uses. The existing land uses surrounding the subject lands consist of small agricultural and residential parcels with inactive agriculture except grazing.



NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, DETERMINED AND ORDERED by the Yuba Local Agency Formation Commission Yuba as follows:

- 1. The foregoing recitals are true and correct.
- 2. In reviewing this application, the Commission finds that all property owners in said territory consent to this annexation to the Olivehurst Public Utility District.
- 3. In reviewing this application, the Commission finds that all of the services provided by the Olivehurst Public Utility District are necessary and the duplication of services for fire and EMS services will not occur since the property is within the Linda County Fire Protection District.
- 4. In reviewing this application, this Commission has considered each of the factors required by Government Code Section 56668 and LAFCO's policies.
- 5. The LAFCO Executive Officer's Staff Report and Recommendation for approval of the proposal is hereby adopted.
- 6. The geographic description and map, if rejected by the State Board of Equalization, will be revised at the expense of the applicant.
- 7. The boundaries, as set forth in the proposal or as amended by action of the Commission, are hereby approved as submitted and are as described in Exhibit "A" Map and "B" Geographic Description attached hereto and by this reference incorporated herein subject to the terms and conditions included.
- 8. Said territory is found to be uninhabited.
- 9. The subject proposal is assigned the following short form designation: Rio Del Oro Annexation to the Olivehurst Public Utility District (LAFC-2023-0007)
- 10. The boundaries of the affected territory are found to be definite and certain.
- 11. The County of Yuba prepared and certified an EIR with mitigation measures for the Plumas Lakes Specific Plan on August 4, 1993, pursuant to the requirements of the

California Environmental Quality Act (Section 21000 et seq of the Public Resources Code) On February 16, 2005 the County of Yuba makes a specific determination for TSTM 2004-2029 that the issues and mitigation measures as adopted by the lead agency adequately addresses this annexation and no further environmental review is needed or required.

- 12. The application for annexation to the Olivehurst Public Utility District (LAFC-2023-0007/Rio Del Oro Villages (Lennar property) is hereby approved to provide water, wastewater, parks and recreation services.
- 13. The project proponent(s) shall agree to be placed within the boundaries of proposed CSA No. 70 (LAFCO2004-0014/Yuba County) and agree to pay an annual assessment for law enforcement services as a method of minimizing the effects of this annexation upon the local governmental structure of Yuba County.
- 14. Further protest proceedings are waived, and the Commission orders the 44.13 acres more or less annexation into the Olivehurst Public Utility District, pursuant to Part 4 commencing with Section 57000. Since satisfactory proof has been given that the subject territory is uninhabited, that all landowners within the affected territory have given their written consent to the proposal and all affected agencies have consented in writing to the waiver of conducting authority proceedings (Section 56663 of Government Code).
- 15. As stated in the LAFCo Staff Report of July 24, 2024, and attached as Exhibit "C", Board of Supervisor's Resolution 2004-157, whereby the amount of base property tax transferred to the Olivehurst Public Utility District from the County General Fund pursuant to Section 99 of the California Revenue and Taxation Code shall be zero.
- 16. All Yuba County, LAFCo and State of California fees must be paid in full prior to recording the Certificate of Completion. LAFCO will forward invoices and (or) a list of required fees to the agency prior to filing the Certificate of Completion for direct payment by project proponent.
- 17. The Certificate of Completion for this annexation to OPUD (LAFCo File 2023-0007 shall be recorded concurrently with the annexation to CSA66 (LAFCo File 2023-0003).
- 18. Approval of this annexation is conditioned upon the applicant's obligation to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the Yuba Local Agency Formation Commission and its agents, officers and employees from any claim, action or proceeding against the Commission or its agents, officers, and employees; including all costs, attorney's fees, expenses and liabilities incurred in the defense of such claim, action, or proceeding to attack, set aside, or void the approval or determinations of this Commission concerning this annexation. The Yuba Local Agency Formation

Commission shall promptly notify the applicant of any such claim, action, or proceeding and be entitled to representation by counsel of its choosing.

- 19. One electronic copy (PDF and two 8 1/2 x 11 reductions of all maps along with an electronic copy (PDF) and two copies of the final boundary description shall be wet stamped and submitted to Yuba LAFCo prior to recordation of the Certificate of Completion.
- 20. The effective date for this annexation is the date the Certificate of Completion is recorded.
- 21. All Olivehurst Public Utility District previously authorized assessments; taxes, fees and charges shall apply to this annexed territory upon recordation of the Certificate of Completion.
- 22. The Executive Officer of this Commission is instructed to mail a certified copy of this resolution to those persons so indicated on the application and as required by Government Code Section 56882.
- 23. Completion of proceedings shall be concluded within one year after adoption of this resolution. If the proceedings are not concluded within one year after adoption of this resolution, all proceedings shall be terminated.



RESOLUTION NO. 2004-157

MASTER PROPERTY TAX REVENUE EXHANGE RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF YUBA TO ESTABLISH A DISTRIBUTION OF PROPERTY TAX REVENUE ON ANNEXATIONS AND DETACHMENTS OF PROPERTY TO THE OLIVEHURST PUBLIC UTILITY DISTRICT

WHEREAS, under the provisions of Proposition 13 adopted in 1978, the distribution of property taxes within each county became the responsibility of the County Board of Supervisors; and

WHEREAS, Proposition 13 failed to make any provision for the redistribution of these taxes, as a result of reorganization of cities and districts within the County; and

WHEREAS, Revenue and Taxation Code Section 99(b) designates the Yuba County Board of Supervisors as the agency responsible for deciding what sort of property tax revenue exchanges should occur in the case of special district annexations and detachments with the County; and

WHEREAS, a resolution must be adopted establishing the extent and nature of property tax exchanges before any annexation or detachment is complete; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors has consulted with the Olivehurst Public Utilities District pursuant to Revenue and Taxation Code Section 99 (b) (5).

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Yuba as follows:

- 1. All exchanges of property tax revenue for special district annexations and detachments shall be governed by this resolution;
- 2. The exchange of property taxes shall be effective beginning any roll year only if the special district annexation or detachment has been completed and approved by the State Board of Equalization prior to December 1st of the preceding year;
- 3. Regarding the property tax revenue exchange for special district annexations, no share of property tax revenue (including base tax revenue and annual tax increment) belonging to the County or any taxing agency within the subject territory shall be exchanged with the annexed special district as a result of the annexation;

- Regarding the property tax revenue exchange for special district detachments, any share of property tax revenue (including base tax revenue and annual tax increment) belonging to the detached property shall be distributed to the County and to all of the other taxing agencies within the subject territory based on their share of property tax revenue within the subject tax rate area.
- The Yuba County Auditor-Controller is hereby directed to distribute the property tax revenues for the taxing agencies within the subject annexation or detachment area in accordance with this resolution.

The foregoing master property tax revenue exchange resolution was passed and adopted at a Regular meeting of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Yuba held on the 26th day of OCTOBER , 2004, by the following vote:

Mission

As a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, CALAFCO supports LAFCOs by promoting efficient and sustainable government services based on local community values through legislative advocacy and education.

Values

The underlying values that define our organization are: *dependability, efficiency, honesty,* and *transparency*.

Duties

Board members have the following legal duties:

- 1. **Duty of Care:** Ensuring prudent use of all assets including financial, facility, people, and good will.
- 2. **Duty of Loyalty:** Ensuring that the association's activities and transactions are, first and foremost, advancing its mission; Recognizing and disclosing conflicts of interest; Making decisions that are in the best interest of the association and not in the best interest of an individual board member, or any other individual or entity.
- 3. **Duty of Obedience:** Ensuring that the association obeys applicable laws and regulations; follows its own bylaws and policies; and that it adheres to its stated corporate purposes/mission.

Position

The Board is a governing body and is expected to support the work of CALAFCO by providing mission-based leadership and strategic governance. - Reviewing agenda and supporting materials, and communicating question to the Executive Director, prior to board and committee meetings.
- Weighing the organization's outcomes against strategic plan initiatives.
- Approving CALAFCO's annual budget, financial reports, and business decisions; being informed of, and meeting all, legal and fiduciary responsibilities.
- Assisting the ED and board chair in identifying and recruiting other Board Members to ensure CALAFCO's commitment to a diverse board and staff that recognizes the differing perspectives among LAFCOs.
- Partnering with the ED and other board members to ensure that board resolutions are carried out.
- Serving on committees or task forces and taking on special assignments, as needed.

Board Terms/Expected Participation

CALAFCO's Board Members are elected during regional caucuses held at the association's annual meeting, and serve two-year terms.

Regular board meetings are held quarterly, special meetings are called as needed, strategic planning retreats are held every two years, committee meetings are called at different times during the year, and legislative canvasing in Sacramento may be needed. Two absences, within a calendar year, from any regularly scheduled board meetings constitutes a resignation of the Board member.

Qualifications

Board Members must be seated LAFCO Commissioners at their local level.

This is an extraordinary opportunity for an individual who is passionate about the importance of the role that LAFCOs play in the sustainable growth of a region, and who has a track record of leadership. His/her accomplishments will allow him/her to interface effectively with the state legislature, as well as attract other well-qualified, high-performing Board Members.

Remuneration

Service on CALAFCO's Board of Directors is without remuneration. Administrative support, travel, and accommodation costs are typically provided by a director's home LAFCO.



Board of Directors Nomination and Election Procedures and Forms

The procedures for nominations and election of the CALAFCO Board of Directors [Board] are designed to assure full, fair and open consideration of all candidates, provide confidential balloting for contested positions and avoid excessive demands on the time of those participating in the CALAFCO Annual Conference.

The Board nomination and election procedures shall be:

1. APPOINTMENT OF AN ELECTION COMMITTEE:

- a. Following the Annual Membership Meeting the Board shall appoint an Election Committee of four members of the Board. The Election Committee shall consist of one member from each region whose term is not ending.
- b. The Board Chair shall appoint one of the members of the Election Committee to serve as Committee Chair. The CALAFCO Executive Director shall either serve as staff to the Election Committee or appoint a CALAFCO regional officer to serve as staff in cooperation with the Executive Director.
- c. Each regional officer shall serve as staff liaison to the Election Committee specifically to assist in conducting the election as directed by the Executive Director and Committee.
- d. Goals of the Committee are to encourage and solicit candidates by region who represent member LAFCOs across the spectrum of geography, size, and urban-suburban-rural population, and to provide oversight of the elections process.

2. ANNOUNCEMENT TO ALL MEMBER LAFCOS:

- a. No later than four months prior to the Annual Membership Meeting, the Election Committee Chair shall send an announcement to each LAFCO for distribution to each commissioner and alternate. The announcement shall include the following:
 - i. A statement clearly indicating which offices are subject to the election.
 - ii. A regional map including LAFCOs listed by region.
 - iii. The specific date by which all nominations must be received by the Election Committee. The deadline shall be no later than 30 days prior to the opening of the Annual Conference. Nominations received after the closing date shall be returned to the proposing LAFCO marked "Received too late for Election Committee action."
 - iv. The names of the Election Committee members and the name of their LAFCO, regional representation, email address and phone number. The name, email address and phone number of the Executive Director shall also be included.
 - The email address and physical address to send the nominations forms.
 - vi. A form for a Commission to use to nominate a candidate and a candidate resume form of no more than one page each to be completed for each nominee.
 - vii. The specific date by which all voting delegate names are due.

viii. The specific date by which absentee ballots must be requested, the date CALAFCO will

distribute the absentee ballots, and the date by which they must be received by the Executive Director.

b. A copy of these procedures shall be posted on the web site.

3. THE ELECTION COMMITTEE:

- a. The Election Committee and the Executive Director have the responsibility to monitor nominations and help assure that there are adequate nominations from each region for each seat up for election. No later than two weeks prior to the Annual Conference, the Election Committee Chair shall distribute to the members the Committee Report organized by regions, including copies of all nominations and resumes, which are received prior to the end of the nomination period.
- b. At the close of the nomination period, the Election Committee shall prepare regional ballots. Each region will receive a ballot specific to that region. Each region shall conduct a caucus at the Annual Conference for the purpose of electing their designated representatives. Caucus elections must be held prior to the annual membership meeting at the Conference. The assigned regional officers along with a member of the Election Committee shall tally ballots at each caucus and provide the Election Committee the names of the elected Board members and any open seats. In the event of a tie, the regional officer and Election Committee member shall immediately conduct a run-off ballot of the tied candidates.
- c. Make available sufficient copies of the Committee Report for each Voting Delegate by the beginning of the Annual Conference. Only the designated Voting Delegate, or the designated Alternate Voting Delegate shall be allowed to pick up the ballot packet at the Annual Conference.
- d. Make available blank copies of the nomination forms and resume forms to accommodate nominations from the floor at either the caucuses or the annual meeting (if an at-large election is required).
- e. Advise the Executive Director to provide "CANDIDATE" ribbons to all candidates attending the Annual Conference.
- f. Advise the Executive Director to provide "VOTING DELEGATE" ribbons to all voting delegates attending the Annual Conference.
- g. Post the candidate statements/resumes organized by region on a bulletin board or other easily accessible location near the registration desk.
- h. Regional elections shall be conducted as described in Section 4 below. The representative from the Election Committee shall serve as the Presiding Officer for the purpose of the caucus election and shall be assisted by a regional officer from a region other than their own, as assigned by the Executive Director
- i. Following the regional elections, in the event that there are open seats for any offices subject to the election, the Election Committee Chair shall notify the Chair of the Board of Directors that an at-large election will be required at the annual membership meeting and to provide a list of the number and category of seats requiring an at-large election.

4. ELECTRONIC BALLOT FOR LAFCO IN GOOD STANDING NOT ATTENDING ANNUAL MEETING

Limited to the elections of the Board of Directors

- a. Any LAFCO in good standing shall have the option to request an electronic ballot if there will be no representative attending the annual meeting.
- b. LAFCOs requesting an electronic ballot shall do so in writing to the Executive Director no later than 30 days prior to the annual meeting.
- c. The Executive Director shall distribute the electronic ballot no later than two weeks prior to the

annual meeting.

- d. LAFCO must return the ballot electronically to the Executive Director no later than three working days prior to the annual meeting.
- e. LAFCOs voting by electronic ballot may discard their electronic ballot if a representative is able to attend the annual meeting.
- f. LAFCOs voting under this provision may only vote for the candidates nominated by the Election Committee as noted on the ballot and may not vote in any run-off elections.

5. AT THE TIME FOR ELECTIONS DURING THE REGIONAL CAUCUSES OR ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING:

- a. The Presiding Officer shall:
 - i. Review the election procedure with the membership of their region.
 - ii. Present the Election Committee Report (previously distributed).
 - iii. Call for nominations from the floor by category for those seats subject to this election:
 - 1. For city member.
 - 2. For county member.
 - 3. For public member.
 - 4. For special district member.
- b. To make a nomination from the floor, a LAFCO, which is in good standing, shall identify itself and then name the category of vacancy and individual being nominated. The nominator may make a presentation not to exceed two minutes in support of the nomination.
- c. When there are no further nominations for a category, the Presiding Officer shall close the nominations for that category.
- d. The Presiding Officer shall conduct a "Candidates Forum". Each candidate shall be given time to make a brief statement for their candidacy. If a candidate is absent from the regional caucus, they may ask someone in their region to make a brief statement on their behalf.
- e. The Presiding Officer shall then conduct the election:
 - For categories where there are the same number of candidates as vacancies, the Presiding Officer shall:
 - 1. Name the nominees and offices for which they are nominated.
 - Call for a voice vote on all nominees and thereafter declare those unopposed candidates duly elected.
 - ii. For categories where there are more candidates than vacancies, the Presiding Officer shall:
 - 1. Poll the LAFCOs in good standing by written ballot.
 - 2. Each LAFCO in good standing may cast its vote for as many nominees as there are vacancies to be filled. The vote shall be recorded on a tally sheet.

- 3. Any ballots submitted electronically for candidates included in the Election Committee Report shall be added to the tally.
- With assistance from the regional officer, tally the votes cast and announce the results.

iii. Election to the Board shall occur as follows:

- 1. A majority of the total number of LAFCOs in a given region are required for a quorum. Returned absentee ballots shall count towards the total required for a quorum.
- 2. The nominee receiving the majority of votes cast is elected.
- 3. In the case of no majority, the two nominees receiving the two highest number of votes cast shall face each other in a run-off election. Electronic ballots are not included in the tally for any run-off election(s).

4. In case of tie votes:

- a. A second run-off election shall be held with the same two nominees.
- b. If there remains a tie after the second run-off, the winner shall be determined by a draw of lots.

6. ADDITIONAL PROCEDURES

- a. For categories where there are more candidates than vacancies, names shall be listed on the ballot in the order the nomination was received and deemed complete.
- b. The Election Committee Chair shall announce and introduce all Board Members elected during the Regional Caucuses at the annual business meeting.
- c. In the event that Board seats remain unfilled after a Regional Caucus, an election will be held immediately at the annual business meeting to fill the position at-large. Nominations will be taken from the floor and the election process will follow the procedures described in Section 4 above. Any commissioner or alternate from a member LAFCO may be nominated for at-large seats.
- d. Seats elected at-large become subject to regional election at the expiration of the term. Only representatives from the region may be nominated for the seat.
- e. As required by the Bylaws, the members of the Board shall meet as soon as possible after election of new Board members for the purpose of electing officers, determining meeting places and times for the coming year, and conducting any other necessary business.

7. LOSS OF ELECTION IN HOME LAFCO

Board Members and candidates who lose elections in their home office shall notify the Executive Director within 15 days of the certification of the election.

8. FILLING BOARD VACANCIES

Vacancies on the Board of Directors may be filled by appointment by the Board for the balance of the unexpired term. Appointees must be from the same category as the vacancy, and should be from the same region.

ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS NOMINATION PROCEDURE:

- 1. Most nominations may be made by an individual, a LAFCO, a CALAFCO Associate Member, or any other organization.
- 2. Each nomination must meet the specific award category criteria for consideration.
- 3. With the exception of the Lifetime Achievement Award, all nominated projects or acts of service must have occurred or been completed between August 18, 2023, and August 15, 2024.
- 4. Nominations must be submitted with a completed nomination form. Please use a separate form for each

nomination. The form is your opportunity to highlight the most important points of your nomination.

- 5. Nomination Executive Summaries must be limited to no more than 250 words in length. Nomination Summaries must be limited to no more than 1,000 words or 2 pages in length maximum. CALAFCO ACHIEVEMENT AWARD CATEGORIES, NOMINATION & SELECTION CRITERIA

Every year, CALAFCO recognizes excellence within the LAFCO community, and among the full membership, by presenting *Achievement Awards* at the CALAFCO Annual Conference. Nominations are now open and being accepted until *Saturday, August 31, 2024* in the following categories:

OUTSTANDING CALAFCO VOLUNTEER

Award Summary:

Recognizes a CALAFCO volunteer who has provided exemplary service during the year past. Exemplary service is service which clearly goes above and beyond that which is asked or expected in the charge of their responsibilities. This category may include a CALAFCO Board member, regional officer, program volunteer, or any other requested volunteer.

Nomination criteria:

- 1. Nominee must have volunteered for the Association during the year in which the nomination is being made.
- 2. Nominee does not have to be a CALAFCO member.
- 3. Volunteer efforts must have demonstrated the individual going above and beyond what was asked/expected with positive and effective results.
- 4. Nominee can be a CALAFCO Board member, regional officer, program volunteer or any other volunteer.

Selection criteria:

- 1. Must meet all nomination criteria requirements for consideration.
- Equal consideration shall be given to each nominee, regardless of their position or role as a volunteer. Only the contributions and outcomes shall be considered, not the individual's position.
- 3. The extent of the volunteerism and the overall impact to the statewide Association and membership based on that volunteerism shall be considered.
- 4. Preference may be given to individuals who have not previously received this award and meet all the required criteria.

OUTSTANDING CALAFCO ASSOCIATE MEMBER

Award Summary:

Presented to an active CALAFCO Associate Member (person or agency) that has advanced or promoted the cause of LAFCOs by consistently producing distinguished work that upholds the mission and goals of LAFCOs and has helped elevate the role and mission of LAFCOs through its work. Recipient consistently demonstrates a collaborative approach to LAFCO stakeholder engagement.

Further, the individual or firm has a proven commitment to the Association membership through volunteering time and resources to further the cause of LAFCO and CALAFCO.

Nomination criteria:

- 1. Nominee must be a CALAFCO Associate Member in good standing with the Association.
- 2. Nominee shall be an Associate Member for the full year in which the nomination is being made.
- 3. The Associate Member nominated shall have been an Associate Member in good standing with the Association for at least one year prior to the year for which the nomination is being made.
- 4. As an Associate Member, the nominee may be an individual, firm or agency.
- 5. The nominee may be an individual within an Associate Member firm or agency.
- 6. Nominee shall demonstrate that through their work as an Associate Member, the role and mission of LAFCO has been upheld and furthered.
- 7. Nominee must have proven cooperative and collaborative approaches to situations and solutions that affect LAFCOs statewide as an Associate Member.
- 8. Proven commitment to the Association's membership as an Associate Member by volunteering resources to the Association during the year in which the nomination is made.

Selection criteria:

- 1. Must meet all nomination criteria requirements for consideration.
- 2. Equal consideration shall be given to all nominees that meet the nominating criteria.
- 3. The level of volunteering time and resources to the Association shall be a consideration with all other nomination criteria.

OUTSTANDING COMMISSIONER

Award Summary:

Presented to an individual Commissioner for extraordinary service to his or her Commission. Extraordinary service is considered actions above and beyond those required in the course of fulfilling their statutory responsibilities as a Commissioner. It requires consistently demonstrating independent judgment on behalf of the interest of the entire county, developing innovative and collaborative solutions to local issues, and leading the commission and community by example.

Nomination criteria:

- 1. Nominee must be a Commissioner of a LAFCO in good standing with the Association.
- 2. Nominee shall be a Commissioner for the full year in which the nomination is being made.
- 3. Proven demonstration of consistently exercising independent judgment for the greater good of the County is required.
- 4. Proven leadership of the commission and the community through collaborative, innovative and creative solutions to local issues is required.
- 5. Proven effective results and outcomes shall be demonstrated in the nomination.

Selection criteria:

- 1. Must meet all nomination criteria requirements for consideration.
- 2. Equal consideration shall be given to all nominees that meet the nominating criteria.
- 3. Representation type (city-county-district-public) shall not be a consideration nor shall be the size or geographic area of the LAFCO on which the Commissioner serves.

- 4. The overall impact of the leadership of the Commissioner shall be considered.
- 5. Preference may be given to individuals who have not previously received this award and meet all the required criteria.

OUTSTANDING LAFCO PROFESSIONAL

Award Summary:

Recognizes an Executive Officer, Staff Analyst, Clerk, Legal Counsel or any other LAFCO staff person for exemplary service during the past year. Exemplary service is considered actions which clearly go above and beyond that which is asked, expected, or required in the charge of their LAFCO responsibilities.

Nomination criteria:

- 1. Nominee must be a staff person of a LAFCO in good standing with the Association.
- 2. Nominee shall be a staff person for the full year in which the nomination is being made.
- 3. As a staff person, the nominee can be either an employee of the LAFCO or a contractor providing employee-type services to the LAFCO.
- 4. Efforts must be demonstrated that the individual has consistently gone above and beyond or outside the scope of their role or job responsibilities, with proven results that otherwise would not have occurred.

Selection criteria:

- 1. Must meet all nomination criteria requirements for consideration.
- 2. Equal consideration shall be given to all nominees that meet the nominating criteria.
- 3. Position within a LAFCO shall not be a consideration, nor shall be the size or geographic area of the LAFCO.
- 4. The overall impact of the LAFCO professional to their LAFCO and the greater community shall be considered.
- 5. Preference may be given to individuals who have not previously received this award and meet all the required criteria.

LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Award Summary:

Recognizes any individual who has made extraordinary contributions to the statewide LAFCO community in terms of longevity of service, exemplary advocacy of LAFCO-related legislation, proven leadership in approaching a particular issue or issues, and demonstrated support in developing and implementing innovative and creative ways to support the goals of LAFCOs throughout California. At a minimum, the individual should be involved in the LAFCO community for at least twenty (20) years.

Nomination criteria:

- 1. Nomination must be received from a member LAFCO or Associate Member in good standing with the Association.
- 2. A minimum of 20 years direct involvement with the LAFCO community is required for

- consideration.
- 3. During that time, nominee shall have a proven positive impact and effect on the support and evolution of LAFCOs statewide.
- 4. This includes advocacy of LAFCOs statewide through legislation, developing creative and innovative solutions to LAFCO issues that serve beyond their LAFCO to the greater good, and collaborative stakeholder approaches to issues and opportunities to further the cause and mission of LAFCO.

Selection criteria:

- 1. Must meet all nomination criteria requirements for consideration.
- Preference may be given to nominees who also have proven experience volunteering for CALAFCO through a regional officer role, serving on committees, serving on the CALAFCO Board, or any other method of volunteering for the Association that serves to promote and support the mission and work of LAFCOs throughout the state.

LEGISLATOR OF THE YEAR

Award Summary:

Presented to a member of the California State Senate or Assembly in recognition of leadership and valued contributions in support of LAFCO goals that have a statewide effect. The recipient shall have demonstrated clear support and effort to further the cause and ability of LAFCOs to fulfill their statutory mission. Selected by CALAFCO Board by super majority.

Nomination criteria:

- Nominee shall be a California State legislator during the full year in which the nomination was made
- 2. Nominee must have demonstrated extraordinary leadership in the Legislature on behalf of LAFCOs statewide, with efforts resulting in a positive impact for all LAFCOs.

Selection criteria:

- 1. Must meet all nomination criteria requirements for consideration.
- 2. All Legislator of the Year nominations shall be forwarded by the Achievement Awards Committee to the Board for consideration.
- 3. Selection of the recipient of this award shall be done with a super majority approval of the Board (present at the time of the vote).

MIKE GOTCH EXCELLENCE IN PUBLIC SERVICE AWARD

Award Summary:

Awarded to an individual, group or agency for actions that rise above expected or common functions or actions that are LAFCO-related; and reduce or eliminate common institutional roadblocks; and result in a truly extraordinary public service outcome. Individuals, a LAFCO, or collaborative effort among multiple LAFCOs or a LAFCO with other entities are eligible. Other entities shall be decision-making bodies at the local, regional or state level. This award has two distinct categories, each focusing on a specific area:

1. Protection of agricultural and open space lands and prevention of sprawl

2. Innovation, collaboration, outreach and effective support of the evolution and viability of local agencies, promotion of efficient and effective delivery of municipal services

Award categories:

Protection of agricultural and open space lands and prevention of sprawl

Includes the development and implementation of programs or other actions associated with agriculture, water, flood control, parks and recreation, habitat conservation plans and public lands. Demonstrates the recipient has identified, encouraged and ensured the preservation of agricultural and open space lands. Proven actions that encourage cities, counties and special districts to direct development away from all types of agricultural lands, including prime agricultural lands and open space lands. Includes demonstrated consideration given in decisions to Regional Transportation Plans, including sustainable communities strategies and other growth plans to ensure reliable services, orderly growth, and sustainable communities.

• Innovation, collaboration, outreach and effective support of the evolution and viability of local agencies, promotion of efficient and effective delivery of municipal services

Includes the development and implementation of innovate support and systems within internal LAFCO operations in the support of local agencies. Actions produce systemic and sustainable improvements and innovation of local government. Proven facilitation of constructive discussions with local and regional agencies and proactive outreach to local and regional agencies as well as local stakeholders and communities to identify issues and solutions and demonstrated action as a coordinating agency in offering and supporting unique local solutions to meet local challenges. Successful demonstration of development of capacities and abilities of local agencies. Provide tools and resources to local agencies to address aging infrastructure, fiscal challenges and the maintenance of existing services. Demonstrated action to streamline the provision of local services with proven results that services are consistent or have been improved as a result, with little to no increased cost to the consumer. Focused efforts and proven results to ensure delivery of services to all communities, especially disadvantaged communities.

Nomination criteria:

- 1. Clear demonstration that the actions rise above expected or common functions or actions.
- 2. The actions reduced or eliminated common institutional roadblocks.
- 3. The actions clearly proven a truly extraordinary public service outcome that is systemic and sustainable.
- 4. Identified unique circumstances and factors leading to the solution/project.
- 5. The innovative steps taken by the LAFCO or entity/entities/individual to solve the problem, overcome the situation, or to take action.
- 6. Clear description of the results/outcomes of the work and the short- and long-term effects.
- 7. How this work can be promoted as a LAFCO best practice.
- 8. Clear demonstration how this nomination meets all criteria.

Selection Criteria:

- 1. Must meet all nomination criteria requirements for consideration.
- 2. Equal consideration shall be given to each nominee within each category. The size or geographic area of the LAFCO within a given category shall not be a consideration.
- 3. The overall impact of the actions and outcomes to the greater community being served shall be considered.
- 4. The level of impact based on the required nomination criteria shall be considered.

QUALIFYING PERIOD: With the exception of the Lifetime Achievement Award, all nominated projects or acts of service must have occurred or been completed between August 18, 2023, and August 15, 2024.
